Indoor masks no longer required in 94% of counties

Ninety-four percent of counties across the U.S. have low and medium community levels of Covid-19 as of March 10, determined by using a county's new case and hospitalization numbers. That means masks are no longer necessary in those counties regardless of vaccination status, according to new CDC guidance. Covid-19 cases, deaths and hospitalizations are all on a downward trend. However, there was still a seven-day average of 1,186 new Covid-19 deaths recorded on March 14.

Three Omicron variants make up all Covid-19 cases


MOST COMMON VARIANTS, FROM THE WEEK ENDING DEC. 11 TO MARCH 12

The latest in pandemic news

- The omnibus bill passed by Congress this week cut \$15.6 billion in Covid-19 relief funding that the National Institutes of Health had requested to run trials on Covid-19 treatments, tests and vaccines.
- Pfizer's CEO Albert Bourla said a fourth Covid-19 booster shot will be needed and that the protection from three doses does not last long against a variant like Omicron.
- 81.5% of Americans 5 years and older have received at least one dose of a Covid-19 vaccine.
