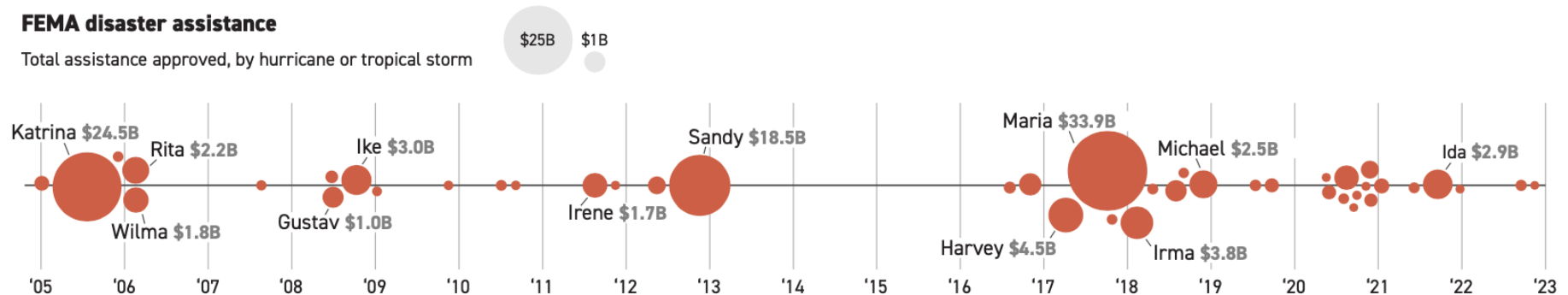

# Breaking down \$107B in hurricane recovery assistance

President Joe Biden declared an emergency Sept. 29 as Hurricane Ian battered Florida and caused widespread flooding. Under a major disaster declaration, individuals and business owners in impacted areas are eligible for grants and loans that cover temporary housing, repairs and uninsured property losses. State, local and tribal governments can also receive federal dollars for public assistance, such as debris removal, emergency medical care and infrastructure repair. FEMA has approved nearly \$107 billion in hurricane-related disaster assistance since the start of fiscal 2005.

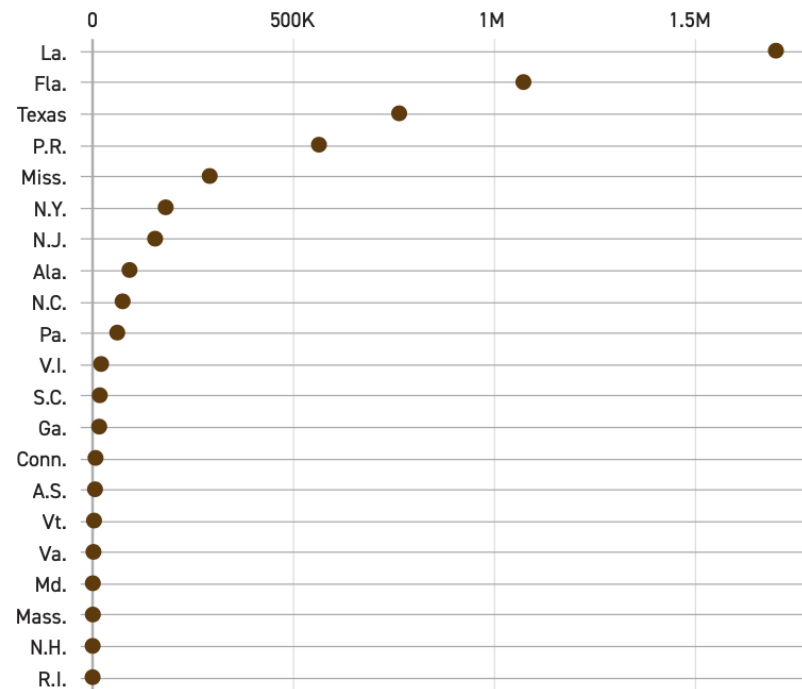
