



Who still has cash to spend in toss-up Senate races

Incumbents in key Senate races hold significant cash advantages with a month before the midterms. Here's how much cash on hand candidates have to spend and how much they've already used up as of the end of the third quarter.

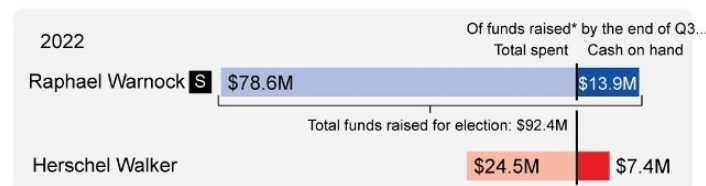
Cash on hand at the end of Q3

Georgia

Democrat Raphael Warnock defeated incumbent Kelly Loeffler in a previous special runoff election. This year, Warnock is running against Herschel Walker, a favorite of former President Donald Trump.

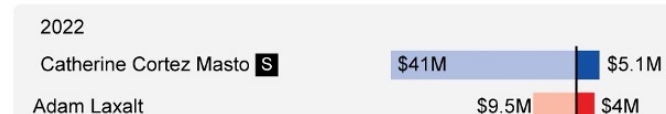

Nevada

Democrat Catherine Cortez Masto became the first-ever elected Latina senator in 2016, succeeding former Sen. Harry Reid, who had held the seat for 30 years. This year, she's running against former state Attorney General Adam Laxalt. As of the end of the third quarter, Cortez Masto had about \$1.1 million more cash on hand than Laxalt.

Pennsylvania

In one of the closest races this cycle, Democratic lieutenant governor John Fetterman is running against television personality Mehmet Oz. Fetterman has largely been supported by small-dollar donors. Oz, however, has poured more than \$21 million of his own money into his campaign.



Wisconsin

GOP Sen. Ron Johnson is running for a third term against Democratic nominee Lt. Gov. Mandela Barnes. Johnson is the only Republican running for reelection in a state that President Joe Biden won in 2020. Johnson previously defeated former Sen. Russ Feingold in one of the closest-watched races of the 2016 cycle.
